building good character...there's no place like home!

- After a family meal, take turns having family members share something they respect and appreciate about each other. Next, you may want to think about extended family, friends, and neighbors and the qualities they have that you appreciate.
- 2. Take a cup full of uncooked rice and dump it on a plate. Then ask family members to take turns retrieving each grain using chopsticks. Compare this difficult task with "picking up" unkind words that have spilled from our mouths.
- 3. Establish a no "put-down" policy in your home. For example: Anyone who says something unkind to another family member must make that person's bed!
- 4. On the next trip to the grocery store with your child take the opportunity to point out ways to show respect to others. While waiting in line, let someone with fewer items go ahead of you or allow someone who has been waiting longer than you to move over to the check-out lane that just opened. Be polite to the cashier and take your cart back to the corral when you are finished. Explain to your child that actions like these show that we value and respect others and their property.
